Current Trend Hard to Take

After the soft start to sales last week the Australian wool market again continued the weaker trend, with all micron indicators falling. Merino fleece and skirtings were back between 12 and 45 cents, with crossbreds and cardings loosing around 10 cents. Buyers have for many years told of the difficulties that the months of August and September present to them in terms of trading, and this seems to have been exacerbated this week, having the EMI drop below 1100 cents, the first time since October 2020. The current exchange rates for both the American dollar and Chinese Yuan against a stronger Australian dollar have made the sluggish demand scenario even more challenging. This brought about an increase in seller resistance, with the passed in rate moving up to almost 12%.

With demand not being driven by enterprises further down the wool pipeline, it seems that the larger Chinese top makers are continuing to keep their machinery running, even though wool tops sales are quiet. Four week forecasts for auction volume showing reduced quantities could be responsible for this approach, or perhaps a positive approach to traditional order volumes heading into the northern hemisphere winter might be driving that mindset. Whatever the reasoning is, the largest percentage of the Australian clip now makes its way to China, with 86.4% of volume and 84.1% of value being shipped. The modernisation of the processing facilities over the last twenty or some years must be having an impact, and with India and Italy at 5.1% and 2.6% respectively, there is not a lot left for some diversity.

On Wednesday and Thursday Dubbo showground was home to the National Merino Sheep Show, with studs from around the country on display. The two day event had a number of events that were incorporated into the schedule, with the hogget ewe competition and school wether challenge drawing a crowd. The ewe competition had winners from the different local show run events from around the state come together and be judged, with their bloodlines and districts being noted. The school wether challenge is aimed at educating our high school children from year 7 to 10 about the industry, whilst having a hands on experience with 6 wethers which are run in their ag blocks at the school for around five months. The schools are from all over the state, starting up at the North Coast, the New England, North West Slopes and Plains, Central West, the Hunter Valley and Southern Highlands, with around 700 kids being part of the event. Over the two days the students participate in sheep classing demonstrations, given a yard dog display, shown the finer points of wool judging, and shown career pathways within the sheep and wool industries. The wethers are shorn at the showground, fleeces weighed and micron tested, and then they are judged and assessed for their carcase traits, and finally head to Fletchers International for slaughter. I imagine that a few tears are shed at that point, with the wethers ending up as quiet as dogs on a lead.

Next week's offering is back to under 34,000 bales and Macwool and Carmichael wool will offer around 900 bales on Wednesday.
